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

It's not surprising to learn that 1964 to 1965 was the craziest period of photographer David McCabe's life. For that was when Andy Warhol asked him to be his on-call photographer to document life at his studio, the Factory. This included capturing the artist at parties and at work, including these shots of Warhol and his assistant, Gerard Malanga, constructing the famous Flowers collection.

This commission also involved Warhol calling McCabe and asking such favours as: "Do you think you can meet me at the St Regis tonight? I'm meeting Salvador Dali." For a 24-year-old art school graduate from Leicester, this was the opportunity of a lifetime. "Quite frankly, when Warhol contacted

me in 1964, I didn't know who he was," McCabe admits. "And I didn't realise what I was getting into. But he was such a fantastic and fascinating person, I couldn't resist taking the job. It was the best thing that could have happened to my career."
